CANINE CORNER

Walks are Win/Win for You and Your Dog

Rockaway Borough has quite a few dog owners or dog guardians as I like to refer to them. I know this because every day I walk my two Jack Russell Terriers and we say hello to all of our canine neighbors. We walk when it's cold, rainy, windy...the only days we don't walk is when it is too hot for their paws to be on the pavement or concrete. (You can tell this by putting the back of your hand on the ground - too hot for you means too hot for them.)

Walking is a natural state for dogs. Just like birds fly and fish swim...dogs walk. It's become a meditation of sorts and how we start our day...and end our day...and maybe take a midday break. We walk a lot. For us guardians, it is a great opportunity to catch up on phone calls or listen to an audio book or podcast, and of course, get some exercise. Most of our walks are about 20-30 minutes. If we have more time or the weather is particularly nice, a walk might be an hour or more.

Regular dog walks benefit your dog mentally and physically.

Walks keep your dog flexible and agile. In younger dogs, it can reduce inflammation in their bodies keeping their joints healthy as they age. In older dogs with health conditions such as arthritis, short gentle walks can offer relief. (Of course, check with your veterinarian first if your dog has any medical conditions so you're certain not to overdo it.)

Walks improve your dog's digestive and urinary systems. Yes, peeing on every blade of grass is actually good for them! Sometimes they have to find just the right spot to go...and go again...and again.

Walks reduce anxiety and depression that can in turn reduce destructive behaviors in your dog because they have an outlet for stress relief.

Mental stimulation found by sniffing everything is how they interact with their world. A dog's sense of smell is 1,000-10,000 times better than a human's. There is a lot more going on out there than we think. This interaction can also reduce stress which again, can reduce destructive behaviors at home.

Clearly there's a benefit for our canine friends, but how can we make it even more enjoyable for us? Here is a list of my must-haves for dog walks:

- 1. **Poop bags.** Gone are the days when we can reuse our plastic shopping bags so we need an alternative. I happen to prefer the biodegradable ones. #1 rule of dog walks is clean up after your pet. Let's face it nothing ruins your day like stepping in dog poop.
- 2. Gloves with the tip of the fingers and thumbs cut off. Despite what kind of bags you use, it's nearly impossible to get them open with gloved hands.
- 3. Headlight. Since it gets dark pretty early right now, it's important to be able to see where you're going obviously. Also, it's easier to clean up after your pet if you have a headlight rather than a flashlight. There are lights that attach to your jacket and ones that are part of your hat.
- 4. Properly fitted, reflective leash/collar. It's important that drivers are able to see you and your pooch walking. Be mindful that new sights and sounds can be distracting too. It's important to have a good grip on a sturdy leash and a collar or harness that's fitted properly so if they get started, they won't run off.
- 5. Bluetooth. What better time to catch up with a friend on the phone, finish the next chapter of your audiobook, or listen to the latest episode of your favorite podcast! Bluetooth keeps your hands free for effective dog management.
- 6. Extra poop bags because even when you think you have enough, there's always one more.
- 7. Paw protection. For cold weather, the salt and sand are going to irritate their paws. They might get debris stuck in their pads. When you come back from a cold weather walk, it's a good idea to have a towel or baby wipes ready to quickly wipe off their paws. For hot weather, avoid hot pavement and concrete at all costs. It can cause painful burns to their pads. If you can get your dog to wear booties, you're likely set in either season and you're my hero.

Vegetative collection

Every other Thursday April-December | Vegetative Collection includes grass, leaves and brush. Place leaves and grass in biodegradable brown paper bags or open containers with handles. Keep brush separate from grass and leaves. Do not sweep leaves into the gutter or street. Branches or brush must be tied with string in bundles not to exceed 18 inches in diameter and 4 feet in length. No limbs or brush over 3 inches in diameter will be accepted. Collections should be at the curb the night before.
